

AV IMPROVEMENTS TO THE MEETING HOUSE

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING JUNE 6

Improvements are required to the Audio-Visual systems of the Meeting House to support hybrid services. We want people on their couches and in the pews to have similar high-quality experiences.

For people in their homes using Zoom, we need to purchase a camera that can "see" all the aspects of the service. We will mount a camera with 20x optical zoom on the balcony railing. This camera can be preset to see Tracy at the podium, Frank at the organ, and a bird's eye view of the congregation. It can also be wirelessly controlled to see any part of the Meeting House. Two years ago, several members donated a digital sound system to be used for the summer concert series. This new sound system will be integrated with the camera to provide excellent sound and video on Zoom. The cost of the camera is \$3,500 with another \$1,000 allocated for a dedicated laptop.

For people in the pews, we need to project the recorded Zoom content into the sanctuary. The new sound system gets good quality sound to the Bose speakers in the sanctuary. Getting video into the sanctuary requires some compromise. Because we have significant ambient light, monitors are recommended over a projector and screen. Two 75" monitors mounted over the doorways in the front of the room will be large enough to project content to the room without being the dominating feature of the room. When not in use, the monitors will project artwork. While a projector and screen will have a larger image, getting the room dark enough to make that image clearly visible will detract from the ambience of the room. We understand that adding screens to the sanctuary will require some adjustment, but we have been attending services on screens for more than a year.

The image below shows a mockup of a 75" monitor over one of the doorways.



The cost of the monitors is \$10,000. We need about \$1,000 of electrical work to support them. That makes the total cost of the project to be 16,500. With \$6,000 donation from the Endowment and \$10,500 from the Rogers (Building) Fund, we can immediately finance the project. We will do capital fundraising for this project so we can replenish the Endowment and Rogers Fund over the next several months. The first service using the equipment will be July 11. These hybrid services will take some adjustment for us all, but they will allow maximum participation by our members.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This is my last message, and it is a bittersweet moment. On the one hand, it feels good to step down, knowing that I am leaving the Board of Trustees in capable hands, but I will be sorry to stop meeting the group of dedicated friends each month. It has not been an easy year with constant Zoom meetings and rarely meeting one another in person, but I think this congregation has come through it with flying colors! We have been very fortunate to welcome Rev Tracy Johnson as our half time minister, and she has provided encouraging positive leadership with dedication, thoughtfulness and understanding.

Finance has not been easy with the loss of the Thrift Shop but all of you have been extraordinarily generous in maintaining your contributions so that, with Joe Zahka's able management and the wonderful array of goods and services in our ongoing auction we may break even!! Thanks to Sue Bauer and her superb committee for this magnificent event!



Kevin Howard sent in his memories of the UUMH move to our "building on the hill" 25 years ago this year.

"While I wasn't one of the original "investors" in UUMH Chatham, I still remember the call I got from the Reverend Ed Hardy to join the church. My family were members at First Parish in Brewster, where Ed had done his internship and we were the first family to join UUMH. It was a perfect situation for us, as we lived in Chatham, and we quickly became very active. I was recruited to join the expanding Board, the children went into the nascent Sunday School with Sue Pike, and eventually Harmon Diers recruited me for the choir. Ann Diers created a children's choir, which my girls participated in. The community embraced us, and we embraced the community. It was a beautiful thing for many years. I believe that both girls were positively impacted. Kara has gone on and spent two plus years in Africa in the Peace Corps, returned and earned a Master's in Education from Harvard, and is now working with the State Department on school curriculum internationally. Kristin earned her Master's in Vocal Performance last year from Carnegie Mellon. She had her first vocal training with Ann Diers.

And then, of course, there is the story of The All Worn Out Jug Band. Denis Meacham suggested that several of us get together to work up a set for an April Pledge Dinner. Who knew that it would lead to a band that still exists to this day, has recorded 2 CDs and played in venues all over the Cape, South Shore and the Islands. At one point, the band had 11 participants, most UUMH members.


