

### SPECIAL REPORT FROM BUILDING AND GROUNDS

While having an empty building is bad news for most of you, it is a great opportunity for the Building and Grounds crew. When you get back, you will notice some improvements in the facility.

Room darkening shades have been installed on the lower windows on the Main Street side of the sanctuary. This will allow for less ambient light for videos and slide shows.

Barbara Hanrahan is taking the lead on sprucing up the main bathroom. We expect to remove the wallpaper and paint the walls, trim, and floor. Choosing the color scheme can be the most difficult part of the project.

Joe Zahka is painting the windows on the Queen Anne side of the building. This involves building a barrier of plastic sheeting before scrapping the paint. The windows are cleaned and bleached to remove dirt and mildew. The wood is then primed and painted. It takes another day scrape the excess paint, wash the windows, and clean the area.

John Horn, our cleaning contractor, will be doing a deep cleaning of the Fleck Room instead of the normal light cleaning of the whole building.

Hope you are taking this opportunity to deep clean your own homes.

### FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The contributions which are placed in the open plate that is passed around at Sunday morning services is an important part of the church's income. We would ordinarily expect to receive about \$3000 in the final three months of the church fiscal year ending on June 30. Right now we don't know when Sunday services will resume but if this doesn't happen before the end of June the church budget will become further in the red. The trustees are asking those who donate to the open plate on Sunday morning to consider mailing in that donation perhaps on monthly basis. This would be a big help in dealing with our ongoing budget problem. Thank you.

#### BUILDING SECURITY UPDATE

We have improved the security of the building by installing a chime on the lower level door. When the door is opened, the chime rings in the office. This will help Karen keep track of people entering the building.

In addition, cameras have been installed in the lower level and the sanctuary. These cameras can be live streamed on the iPad in the office. When motion is detected, the cameras record a short video segment.
