### the Rev. Edmund Robinson

Sunday March 26, a delegation from the UU Meeting House will have our second meeting with a delegation from First Parish Brewster, our parent congregation. Recently Beth Avery passed around a set of notes from the first meeting asking what we wanted to emphasize at the second, and our treasurer Joe Zahka, ever concerned with the overall sustainability of this place, zeroed right in on the central issue: how can the two congregations partner to grow the number of Unitarian Universalists in this part of Cape Cod?

Of course we welcome people who are already UUs somewhere else who choose to retire to the Cape's elbow; if they keep up their church involvement, they are likely to choose one of our two congregations. But what about those who retire here with no prior UU involvement? What about those who have been here for a while, whether or not retired? What about those in the workforce – teachers, social workers, firemen? Can we put ourselves on their mental map by our actions and words in the public spaces of these communities?

Actually I think that the question may be slightly askew. We're not trying to "make UUs" of anybody; we're inviting people to join with us in our ongoing work in the community. We don't ask anyone to recite a creed or swear a loyalty oath. We try to meet people where they are in their lives.

Yesterday, a new avenue opened up to make this corner of the world a better place for those who come here from abroad. A group has formed to advocate for sane and humane policies on immigration. It is called the Cape Cod Coalition for Safe Communities. I went to a meeting March 21, and there were people there from 6 or 7 towns on the Cape. That evening, a couple from the group succeeded in getting the Dennis selectmen to adopt the group's proposed policies, and the vote was unanimous! I hope that we can influence the other towns in the area to similar measures.

We have finally received about \$30,000 from the estate of our late member, Sally Duplaix, which has been deposited in the Endowment Fund per her wishes, but which is earmarked for use in Social Justice and Learning for Life. I want to challenge all of us to come up with some good uses for that money so that it can do some good in the world.

### FREEDOM FORUMS AND FACTS MATTER FORUMS

The **Freedom Forums** will continue for two more meeting in April. April 1: the Due Process Clause, and April 15: the Equal Protection Clause. Meetings are 10:30 to 12, you do not have to have attended prior meetings.

### New series: Facts Matter Forums

Building on the success of the Freedom Forums, these will be meetings devoted to specific policy areas in which the national administration is proposing large changes in national policy based on certain readings of the facts. In each forum, we will attempt to get knowledgeable people to give us the current state of understanding, including debatable points, in each area to allow intelligent citizens a basis to research matters for themselves.

The areas include climate change, incarceration crisis, immigration, policing and public safety, school vouchers, global trade, voting rights, transgender rights, religious freedom vs. discrimination, and government support of arts, science, culture. The meetings will probably be on Sunday afternoons in the sanctuary beginning in May. Anyone who wants to help organize this, to suggest speakers or additional topics is welcome to communicate with Edmund.

### UPDATES FROM BUILDING AND GROUNDS

1. To make our Meeting House more welcoming to visitors, we are adding "Visitor Parking" signs to our parking lot. Two of the "Sunday Handicap Parking" signs will be moved to driveway behind the building. Those using the Sunday handicap parking spaces on the driveway can access the building by the ramp to the portico.

2. At the June 2016 meeting, the congregation voted to let the lawn go brown. The sprinkler system was never turned on last year and the lawn certainly went brown. The good news is that the lawn only needed one mowing per month last summer. The bad news is that the portions of the lawn that face due south died. That makes approaches to all entrances of the building unattractive. Not a good situation if we are trying to attract new people to our Meeting House.

The Building and Grounds Committee proposes to turn on the sprinklers in the areas of the lawn on the south side of the building near the steps and near the entrance to the lower level. We think with a minimum of water we can reestablish the lawn and let it go brown in the summer without letting it die.

### **CONGREGATE HOUSE SUPPERS**

Calling for Volunteers to Assist with Preparation of Meals for Congregate Housing -- 2017 Schedule

For the eleventh year the Social Justice committee has agreed, with six other Chatham churches, to share the task of providing a Sunday meal by volunteering to cook and serve simple meals to 14 to 18 senior residents of Chatham's Congregate House.

Congregate Housing offers a shared, affordable living arrangement to elders and disabled adults with supportive social and health services needed to assist individuals to live independently. Congregate living promotes socialization with shared spaces, along with security and privacy to continue living an independent lifestyle.

<u>The UUMH has been assigned its share of Sunday dates for 2017 as follows.</u> April 23, June 18, July 16, September 10, October 8, November 19, December 17.

The meal preparation, all food provided, takes place in the kitchen of the Congregate Housing apartments. Each volunteer crew includes at least one experienced volunteer along with two helpers and someone who volunteers to contribute homemade goodies for dessert. Meal preparation and cleanup usually lasts from 3:30 to 6. Meal must be on the table at 5pm for the residents. The residents really appreciate these home cooked meals.
